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## BINGHAM UNIVERSITY HOLDS STRATEGIC PLANNING WORKSHOP

**B**ingham University recently organised a workshop on strategic planning for its senate members where a paper was presented by a management expert who facilitated the workshop.

The Ag.Vice-Chancellor, Prof. William B. Qurix, OFR, in his welcome address thanked members of the Senate for

attending the workshop. He stated that “We need to come together, brainstorm and bring out ideas that will go into the plan to guide the university”. The Vice-Chancellor stressed that there was a need to assess where the university was at present and where it wanted to be in the next five years and beyond. Prof Qurix added that “The National Universities Commission (NUC) has adjusted the benchmark minimum academic standards such that universities will handle 30% of the curriculum while the NUC handles 70%. Universities are free to put down their own benchmark academic standard for approval by the National Universities Commission, which in turn will serve as a guide to other Universities”. Prof Qurix charged members of the university senate to think ahead and come up with ideas that will improve the university.

Speaking on the topic “Strategic Planning”, the CEO of Jheyah Nigeria Limited and Proprietor Joy International College Kaduna, Mr Timothy B. Gandu stressed the need for strategic planning in every organisation because it serves as a guide for the organisation to embrace goal oriented relationships and avoid conflicts. Mr Gandu continued by saying “a strategic plan represents success and how it is to be achieved as conceived and agreed to by a wide section of the organisation”. He went further to say that a strategic plan serves as a basis for setting performance standards, decision making, planning and resource mobilization and allocation. He stressed that a strategic plan would significantly change the way business is

conducted and clarify where the organisation wants to go. While stressing the benefits of a strategic plan, Mr Gandu stated that “a strategic plan will develop a renewed sense of organisational mission and consensus. It will expose your organisation to others, particularly donors”. He urged the university to have a mandate and know if the mandate was achievable. He stated that visions and missions were reviewable if not achievable at the stipulated period of time. Mr Gandu said that “*SWOT analysis was important because it would enable an organisation identify its strengths/weaknesses, opportunities and threats*”.

He urged members of the university senate to work as a team and treat their subordinates as colleagues and not slaves because they all contribute their own quota to the development of the university as no one knows it all.

After a detailed presentation by the resource person, the workshop went into discussions led by the Ag. Vice-Chancellor, Prof Qurix, where the path for the university's strategic plan towards new heights was charted.

## BINGHAM UNIVERSITY HOLDS FIFTH ENTREPRENEURSHIP CONFERENCE

Bingham University hosted its 5<sup>th</sup> annual entrepreneurship conference tagged “Entrepreneurship Education: the Pathway to Economic Growth and Development”, where several papers were presented by experts and resource persons. The Ag. Vice-Chancellor, Prof. William B. Qurix, OFR, represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Alexander B. Adelaiye, thanked all the experts and participants for attending the conference. He stated that “Entrepreneurship is a subject that demands a lot of attention. Entrepreneurship education is targeted towards focusing attention of individuals to being self-sufficient”. He highlighted that the conference had the ability to transform participants from job seekers to job creators, and stressed that proper entrepreneurship education is key to economic growth in Nigeria. In his

opening remarks the Ag. Director, Entrepreneurship Development Centre, Mr. Peter A. Aroge, welcomed everyone to the 5<sup>th</sup> entrepreneurship conference. He stated that “without entrepreneurship an individual or a nation cannot move forward”. He urged participants to venture into agricultural entrepreneurship and other forms of entrepreneurship activities to grow, as white collar jobs were no longer readily available.

Speaking on the topic “Entrepreneurship Education as the Pathway to Growth in Nigeria”, the Ag. Director Student Support Services of the National Universities Commission (NUC), Dr. Mariam Sali, stressed that the need for entrepreneurs cannot be overemphasised and that the private sector was coordinated by entrepreneurs. She stated that “entrepreneurship education at all levels provides positive results for the



young and old alike". Dr. Sali added that entrepreneurship will improve the gross domestic product of the country because of the increase in the value of locally produced goods and services. She urged universities to support graduating students financially to start-up businesses. Dr Sali further said that "The challenges of entrepreneurship education include the lack of entrepreneurship mind-set and skills, curriculum update and knowledge in entrepreneurship education". Dr Sali concluded her presentation by urging the federal government to provide more funding for entrepreneurship education in the Nigerian Universities System.

On his part, a team member Agric desk Access Bank, Mr Lawan Aliyu spoke extensively on the Access Bank agricultural value chain and financing strategy, stressing that agriculture remained a significant sector in Nigeria. He added that "80% of land in Nigeria is arable but only 40% is utilized". Aliyu went further to recommend financing schemes such as short term, medium term and long term financing for agroentrepreneurs. He informed that the Anchor Borrowers Programme, Agric Credit Guarantee Scheme fund and the pre and post export finance were viable funding programmes that would enable potential or practicing agroentrepreneurs' access funds for their businesses. Mr Aliyu stated that *"These financing schemes are not limited to farming or agriculture alone but are also available to other businesses in the value chain"*. Director, Development Finance

Department of the Central Bank of Nigeria, Mr Elijah Osha emphasised that meeting the needs of the customers is the pathway to progress. Mr Osha stressed that *"micro, small, and finance enterprise is a veritable tool for development. Banks need to channel finance to micro, small, and finance enterprises"*. He challenged the participants to think deeply so as to seize the opportunity to create wealth.

Speaking at the conference, a representative of the Bank of Industry, Miss Suliati Sorengbe stressed that the key to

growth in business is documentation. She added that documentation shows you where you were and where you are going. Miss Sorengbe stated that "you need to have knowledge of the business you are seeking funds for. You need to have an intention or reasons for setting up a business". She added that it was important for entrepreneurs to set-up businesses that will outlive them. She went further to say that "an investor can confidently invest financially in your business when there is a plan. It is also necessary for one to build relationships if you are to develop as an entrepreneur". Miss Sorengbe urged aspiring entrepreneurs not to hesitate but start their businesses now.

Mrs Emc Andy, a Director at the Small and Medium Enterprises Development Agency of Nigeria (SMEDAN), urged the participants to take risk in any business they venture into. She added that *"if you don't take risk you may not be able to function well. You should be creative, open minded and create solutions to problems in our society"*. Mrs Andy pointed out that an entrepreneur must have good time management skills and must not wait for excess before commencing a business. She emphasised that *"when you take risks the*

*reward is worth it"*. In his presentation, a representative of the Institute of Mortgage Brokers and Lenders, Mr Victor Ivoke stressed the need for young people to venture into entrepreneurship rather than wait for a white collar job. He stated that "jobs are still available but not commiserate with the number of graduates' universities churn out yearly". Mr Ivoke urged aspiring mortgage brokers to "find the mortgage rate; it is your duty to explain to your clients and convince them. You have to think like a salesman while mortgage brokering and learn the skill of persuasive communication". He charged aspiring mortgage brokers to create a social media platform for advertisement.

Mr Ibrahim Boyi, a Director at the Federal Mortgage Bank of Nigeria stated that the NHF loan is the cheapest and most affordable in the contemporary Nigerian



financial industry.

He added that *"It is the cheapest because its repayment of six percent interest lasts for a period of thirty years"*. Mr Boyi went further to say that mortgage banks charge applicants the same rate for loans granted through internally generated funds, adding that *"the issue of affordability has always been a problem, the reason being that no one can use 1/3 of his/her monthly salary to repay a loan taken from commercial banks"*. He concluded by saying that the NHF loan is a viable option because it is stripped of the charges associated with the conventional loans taken from commercial banks.

## FIGHTING FINANCIAL CRIMES IN ECWA TAKES CENTER STAGE

Declaring the meeting open, ECWA President, Rev. Stephen Panya Baba, thanked God for another opportunity to brainstorm in the church's fight against corruption and said that ECWA fully supports the genuine fight against such a deadly menace, adding that the church would always condemn all acts of corruption in the country.

According to him, the theme for this year's meeting, *"The fight against financial crimes in ECWA"* was very timely considering the fact that corruption had become the order of the day in the country and the church was not immune to it.

Bingham University was recently adjudged the best university in the use of ICT in teaching for the year 2018, and rewarded for its performance.

The event which took place at the banquet hall of the Sheraton Hotel and Towers, Ikeja, Lagos, on the 6<sup>th</sup> of July 2018, was organized under the auspices of the West African Quality Education Awards. The event is an annual occurrence that encourages sustenance of quality education within the West African sub-

region. Several speakers were on hand to deliver papers on quality education in the West African sub-region.

Represented by the ECWA General Secretary, Rev. Yunusa Sabo Nmadu Jnr, Rev Baba cautioned Christians, particularly those entrusted with the church's finances, to be prudent and accountable in the discharge of their duties so as not to be found wanting for corruption, fraud or misappropriation of church resources.

He disclosed that gone were the days when people embezzled church money and went scot free, as measures had been put in place to check such acts as, according to him, ***“any officer or employee of ECWA involved in a proven case of financial misappropriation or embezzlement of funds shall be subject to dismissal and/or the forfeiture of all entitlements and benefits and shall also be required, if necessary under legal counsel, to refund such moneys.”***

In a keynote address, the General Secretary, Rev. Yunusa Nmadu, stated that available information, showed that ECWA had focused on fighting fraud with sub-strategies of effective whistle-blowing and employee due diligence, stressing that it would continue to devise new ways of tackling the scourge.

Presenting a paper on, ***“On A situation Analysis of Present Challenges, Proposed Action Plan for Implementation to Promote Zero Tolerance for Fraud in ECWA,”*** the ECWA Treasurer, Dr. Kalu Umeh, lamented that despite the efforts ECWA had made in the fight against financial fraud, there are still cases of fraud in the system and ECWA would do everything possible to stamp it out.

There was a goodwill message from the Vice Chancellor, Bingham University, Karu Nasarawa State, Prof. WB Qurix among others.

The programme was organized for heads of departments and units, auditors, accountants, Vice Chancellor of Bingham University and Provosts of Higher Institutions, Principals, DCC Executives and other stakeholders in ECWA, among others.
